


Jordan by zubaida

In the year 63-64 B.C Rome .¹ occupied Jordan , under the ².³ leadership of Pompey, which laid the foundation for the so-called Ten Cities Alliance (Dicabols). Most of them were in Jordan ,Philadelphia(Amman), Gerasa (Jerash),jadara(um Qais)and Arbila(Irbid).Jordan had been under Rome's occupation for four hundred years.



The Romans took control of the area after the kingdom of the Arab Nabataeans was defeated.

The Roman built theaters, temples, baths, public squares and columns in deferent cities in Jordan .They built the Roman theater in Amman and Jeresa city in Jerash Which is located in the north of Jordan.

The most important Roman building is the • Roman Amphitheatre in Amman which was built in the years between 169-177 A.D .This theater had a capacity of 6,000 and has been in front of the square of public meetings (Forum), surrounded by three rows of columns ,and to the east of this square a small theatre (Odeon), which was built for musical ceremonies.



Jerash city (Jerasa) By leena and Zaina

Jerash lies in the north of Jordan on a plain surrounded by hilly wooded areas. It was one of the most important cities of the Roman empire and was visited by the Emperor Hadrian. it was known as Gerasa. It was Hidden for centuries in sand before being discovered and rebuilt over the past 70 years, Jerash had paved and colonnaded streets, hilltop temples, handsome theatres, wide public squares and plazas, baths, fountains and city walls pierced by towers and gates.

1- columns street or cardo:it is the main street in the historic city of Jerash.it is 800 meters long and has about a 1000 column.

Southern theater

2-The southern theater is the largest theater in Jerash. It had a capacity of 3000 to 5000 spectators.it is used today in cultural events such as the Jerash festival.



Hadrian Gate

It is located in the southern part of the historic city. It consists of three large gates with a height of 11 meters . It was built for a celebration of the visit of the Roman emperor Hadrian to the city.



Hypodermic

4-The Hypodermic is a Roman horse and circus playground located in the archaeological area of Jerash,next to Hadrian's Arch. It was used for horse racing and two or four horse carts.



The Cathedral

It is the most beautiful religious building in Jerash. It was originally the Dionysus temple built in the second century AD. Dionysus was the wine god among the Roman era.

Unfortunately the Roman didn't have the blessing of pizza in their lives, and Because they lived near the water, the seafood was their common part of their meal.so fish and shellfish were a common source of the Roman food.They preserved fish and farmed them in artificial salt and fresh water ponds. this allowed fish to be eaten either fresh, dried,salted,smoked or pickled on regular occasion.

They also used cereals
they grew to make bread
